Well sports fans, it is the most wonderful time of the year again, as we begin the 2005 NFL season. This season will culminate in the biggest Super Bowl of all time, aptly named Super Bowl XL. The game will take place in Detroit, so instead of scantily clad females, attendees are instead invited to bring your jammies to the event. The Look Man has never been a fan of the cold weather Bowl sites, but the gaming in Detroit's Greektown should provide some heat in early February.

Pundits predict the same old teams will appear in the event, but the Look Man seriously questions that logic. Historically, we have seen teams rise from the ashes to become competitive in one year. Without further ado, the week in review:

Cincinnati @ Cleveland:

This one was a battle - - - for about 1.5 quarters. Between the scorching heat and the serious ugly of the Bengals uniforms, the Browns fell apart and never recovered after the half. Of course, it didn't hurt that some of the Cincy team was wearing black and white uniforms with no orange at all. The final result was a spoiling of Romeo Crennel's Cleveland debut.

The Bungals scored a TD on a long drive before the half, just like last year, and went up 17-10. They never looked back and won 27-13 against a hapless Browns defense. The ejection of run stuffing Iggle Jeremiah Trotter pretty much sealed the fate of the Iggles, as the Dirty Bird offense doubled its run output from the previous game.

Of perhaps more significance is the injury to Donovan McNabb(sty). While the zebras called a ticky-tack roughing on Michael Vick, they allowed DT Lavolais (means clean hands in French) to spear McNabb. As a result, the Philly QB suffered a similar injury to the one that claimed Air McNair's 2004 season. Stay tuned, but the Look Man believes this may cost Gang Green 2-3 games this season.

Bob Denver, who portrayed the title character on the 1960s television show "Gilligan's Island," died last week at the age of 70. Denver died of complications from cancer treatments after having undergone quadruple heart bypass surgery earlier this year.

TV critics despised Denver's signature show, which lasted only 3 years, but audiences loved the comedy. America was in the midst of a Cold War, and the escapism and sexual tension formed the basis for such shows as Three's Company and Friends. The cast included: Alan Hale Jr., as Skipper Jonas Grumby; Bob Denver, as his klutzy assistant Gilligan; Jim Backus and Natalie Schafer, as rich snobs Thurston and Lovey Howell; Tina Louise, as bosomy movie star Ginger Grant; Russell Johnson, as egghead science professor Roy Hinkley Jr.; and Dawn Wells, as sweet-natured farm girl Mary Ann Summers.

Denver is survived by his wife, Dreama, and 4 children, including his illegitimate son, Lovie Smith, is currently the head coach for the NFLs Chicago franchise. When asked about the mother of Smith, Jim Backus had no comment.
