The Look Man Report 2006 Week 1: Road Field Advantage?

Opening:

Week 1 of the 2006 NFL season featured eleven road teams posting wins on enemy turf, proving that change is the only constant. Only 1983 had more road wins on a single NFL weekend with twelve. Visiting teams felt at home on the road, due to either home-away-from-home cooking by the Zebras, or simply the desire to start strong in their pursuit of the playoffs. ZEBRA OF THE WEEK

The ZOTW competition is taking up right where it left off in 2005. In point of fact, there were so many contestants that the Look Man had to go with the bulletized list approach as follows:

Marine Mammals at Stillers: Zebra - Walt Coleman (Lantern)

- TE Heath (Bar None) Miller out of bounds at the five, but scores when Nick Saban throws the challenge flag too late;
- two questionable illegal contact calls aiding a ball control drive during the 3rd quarter. This drive caused the Mammals D to tire, later giving up big chunks of yardage.

Bungals at Baby Backs: Zebra: Larry Nemmers(kull)

Just for giggles, here is some of the text of the league ruling:

1. When a runner begins to slide feet-first, a defensive player must pull up and avoid unnecessary contact.

2. Quarterbacks who desire to take advantage of the protection provided to a sliding runner are responsible for starting their slide before contact by a defensive player is imminent.

Not only is this wording idiotic, it defeats the intent of the 1985 rule. New age linebackers like Lawrence Taylor, Carl Banks, Otis Wilson, Mike Singletary and a host of others decimated QB ranks in the early 80s, causing the NFL to implement a rule to ensure that Dan Pastorini wouldn't represent the AFC in the Pro Bowl. The rule worked pretty well until 2000, when Tony (Fois Gras) Siragusa knocked Rich Gannon and Steve (Air) McNair out of the playoffs with sufflex tackles.

Rule 7, Section 4, Article 1 provides that the ball is dead and the down ended when any part of a sliding runner's body, other than his hands or feet, touches the ground.

This statute also mandates that no defensive player must touch the QB down in order to end the play. Unbeknownst to most folks (including Mr. Tonight Show in Cincy), the QB cannot slide, then get up and advance the ball. If "contact is unavoidable," and a defender has already committed himself, he can hit the QB with impunity as long as he does not initiate helmet to helmet contact, elbow the QB, or generally turn into Likes to Fight Guy.

This new guideline states that a QB must "make his intentions clear" because if he "...waits until the last moment to begin his slide..." he can be tackled just like "a regular ballcarrier." If that ball carrier was in the Pokes-GV game, that would include trying to unscrew a guy's head using his facemask.

This interpretation is so subjective that it invites controversy instead of defining punishable behavior. Defenders all over the league are now scratching their heads, while QBs are sliding as soon as they run out of the tunnel. Next season, expect QBs to

be required to signal their "intent to slide" with a fair catch signal.

The Look Man finds it odd that a Sr. VP was required to address this issue. Typically, Head of Scapegoat Operations Mike (Pariah) Pereira makes these statements, followed by his weekly show on the NFL Network to explain. Tampa Bay at Atlanta
