WEEK IN REVIEW

Stillers (23) at Bungals (17) [OT]:

As predicted, the Bengals turned Bungals again at Pall Bearer Stadium. In honor of the collegiate bowl week, owner Mike Brown allowed corporate sponsorship for the contest. As a result, in lieu of the usual Bengal tiger, a giant Tampax logo adorned midfield. It was fitting since the Bengals typically end up bloody and have no second string.

Blitzburgh dominated the game until (Fast) Willie Parker coughed up the rock at the 2 yard line en route to the end zone. The Bengals seized the momentum, and scored via a long distance hookup between (Johnny) Carson Palmer and troubled WR Chris Henry.

Henry's sweet 65 yard TD reception put the Bengals in position to win the game despite doing nearly everything in their power to give it away. Not only did Marvin Lewis allow

the offense to go no-huddle in spite of the fact that the Bengals defense spent 40 minutes on the field, he mismanaged his timeouts down the stretch. - 5) not in Cover Three in OT, Holmes goes for 67 yards and the game winner.

Lewis' coaching is so bad that Geico insurance is coming up with a new ad campaign: "Geico.com – so easy Marvin Lewis can do it!" Word on the street is that the "In Marvin we Trust" sign is headed for the Rumpke Dump next week.

Later, that same day, when the Niners knocked off the Donkeys in OT, the last AFC playoff spot went to Kansas City. The ultimate irony is that the Bengals beat the Baby Backs at Agarn Stadium in Week One, courtesy of Robert (Guillotine) Geathers' cheap shot. Who says the Football Gods have no sense of humor?

Detroit (39) at Dallas (31):

Dallas Pro Bowl QB Tony Romo (the Place for Ribs) gave up four fumbles, losing two, threw a pick, and was soundly outplayed by Cadillacs QB Jon Pickna. Pickna threw for three bills and a career high four TDs as offensive coordinator Mike (Megalomaniac) Martz outcoached Dallas D-Coordinator Mike Zimmer. His scoring records may never be broken, but most of them occur in the bedroom, not on the field.

Dirty Birds at Iggles (-8.0):

The Iggles had little to play for in this game since the Pokes had already locked them into the NFC Least title by losing to Detroit. As a result, they benched Jeff Garcia and decided to knock the rust off backup AJ (Touchy) Feely. ZEBRA OF THE WEEK

Despite the playoff implications of the Week 16 games, the zebras failed to distinguish themselves. They bumbled and blew several calls, beginning with Jynts at Genocide Victims on Saturday, and culminating in the Niners at Denver game late Sunday. Here's the dealio:

<u>Jynts at Genocide Vix</u>: Zebra Walt (Disney) Anderson couldn't determine whether WR Plexiglass Burress or DB Ade Jimoh committed pass interference, so he called them both. The offensive and defensive PI calls offset, nullifying a late first half TD and essentially reducing the margin of victory for the G-Men. "Jimoh cracked Cornrows, and I don't care," said Disney. "There were only 18 seconds left in the half, and we didn't want New York to cover the spread."

Commentator Phil Simms applauded the call, but the Look Man is not sure why. In nearly forty years of watching the NFL, the Look Man has seen this call only twice. And it stunk both times.

<u>Niners at Donkeys</u>: Zebra Larry Nemmers(kull) shot his regular at Investigation Field, trying to penalize the Niners into making a critical error. The result was excellent field position for Frisco, which parlayed the position into an overtime FG by veteran K Joe Nedney. <u>Stillers at Bengals:</u> Zebra Bill (Toyota) Carollo still hasn't overturned a replay call in over two years, but the coaches are beginning to figure him out. THE LOOK AHEAD:

The Iggles enter the postseason as the hottest team in the NFC, which isn't saying much. Still, between the Iggles and the Boy Scouts, the NFC should have a very competitive playoff from a story line perspective.

The postseason is usually about matchups, and Dallas and Chicago do not match up well against teams with big, fast wide receivers. Since there seems to be a preponderance of these types in the field, the Look Man expects both of these squads to struggle and yield.

BTW, why is it that the NFL allows Seattle to leave its retractable dome open during driving rainstorms? The Look Man wonders why they even have a roof if they never plan to use it. This attempt to establish a home field advantage reminds the Look Man of New England, which played upon a sloppy track until the league put its foot down. Jynts at Iggles (-6.5):

It seems unlikely that the Iggles will mimic Washington's tactic of lining its safeties 15 yards off the ball, and allowing Tiki Barber to run right by them on the draw play. Barber had two runs over 50 yards against the Genocide Victims, and ended up with nearly 300 yards in total offense. Iggles safety Brian (the Hawk) Dawkins brings a load, and he will be aiming for Tiki's sore right hand.

These two played a thriller just a few weeks ago, and expect the same this week. QB Jeff (Cherry) Garcia plucked his way to a win with great reads and perfectly timed passes. Without Michael Strahan, the G-Men cannot apply the pressure necessary to send Garcia back to the studio to decompose. Iggles may not cover, but win anyway in the *Eli's Cheesecake vs. Ben and Jerry's Ice Cream Bowl.*

Dallas at Seattle (-3.0):

Have the Tailpipes ever noticed how Romo has an extra stitch put in to make his uniform number look like an '8' instead of a '9'? This only occurs when the Pokes wear the white home uniforms, which they should be donning this week. It's almost as if Romo has 'Aikman envy' or something.

But, the Look Man digresses. This game should be a good one, but the Shehawks have a history of beating the Pokes. Seattle won the 2005 game when Drew Bledsoe threw the game away on a pick six. Safety Bob (Colonel) Sanders will need to play well, but the Ponies win with ball control passing to TE Dallas Clark and move to Round Two. Say it with the Look Man: "Dee-caf! Dee-caf!"

Jets at Chowds (-8.5):

Again, the bandwagon is full for the Chowds, who win every other week it seems. Tom (Zoolander) Brady is back on the runway after getting the needle in his sore shoulder. Bill (Dr. Evil) Belichick is trying to take over the world again, one win at a time, but this week faces his former mentee, Eric Mangina. These two do not like each other, and this one has "slobberknocker" written all over it.

Dr. Evil is going through a messy divorce and his coaching is suffering. Zoolander broke up with main squeeze Bridget Moynihan, and his play shows it. The Chowds lost three top assistants, two starting wideouts and their play shows it. Why the media remains on the New England bandwagon is a mystery.

The topper might be that Dr. Evil is losing his hard boiled edge. After allowing 43-yearold Doug Flutie to execute a drop-kick in a meaningless 2005 finale, Dr. Evil inserted third-stringer Vinny Testaverde (means "green head" in Italian) at Tennessee. Vinny Greenhead set an NFL-record with a TD pass in his 20th consecutive season. The feat was not lost on Belichick, who is an avid football historian. The Flaming Thumbtacks were less sanguine about the feat, which extended the New England lead to 17 in a meaningless game. No word on whether the Football Gods approved, but it seems unlikely.
