PROLOGUE

The 2007 NFL season screeched into its official mid-point in Week Nine, but the season has been anything but auspicious. WEEK IN REVIEW

Chowds at Indy (+5) [Game of the Eon]:

For the first time in 2007, 9-0 New England failed to cover the spread. Not only have the Chowds been dominating teams, they rebounded from a ten point fourth quarter deficit to upstage the defending world champs. Browns at Stillers (-9.5):

The Browns are looking to return the 34-7 drubbing put on them in Week One of the season. Unfortunately, the road to four wins in a row is blocked by the Stillers at Ketchup Field. If you saw what the Stillers did to the poor Dumpster Ducks on MNF, you know how tough that can be. Perhaps LB James (Henry) Harrison will be trying not to reveal his secret true identity in this one.

Derek (Neo) Anderson is hoping LB James (Henry) Harrison doesn't turn into Agent Smith or his attempt to conquer the Matrix will be thwarted. Of course, if Braylon Edwards keeps sneaking peaks at the secondary instead of catching the rock, it won't matter. Edwards has dropped nearly as many as he has caught, and he is second in TD receptions only to Randy (the Chronic) Moss.

Kellen Winslow would like to follow up an epic performance against the Shehawks with another strong outing, but his knee and shoulder are pretty banged up. The Look Man likes the Browns to cover after the Stillers' emotional outing on MNF. Expect the Pokes to beat the Jynts en route to a classic showdown with Breen Gay in the postseason.

J-Squareds at Flaming Thumbtacks (-4):

The 'tacks are winning ugly and the J-Squareds are just ugly. J-ville hopes starter David (The Fugitive) Garrard can return from a high ankle sprain, but that would be a mistake. With Houston and Tennessee struggling, and Indy possibly losing in Bolts-ville, The Fugitive would be best suited to avoid this physical defense while getting healthy for a December stretch run.

The Thumbtacks' defense has not allowed a TD in seventeen post-turnover possessions in 2007. They may be without DT (Uncle) Albert Haynesworth, but this D is brutal. Uncle Albert is not so sorry, and he may be the most underrated DT in the NFL. Thumbtacks win, and look for a tie with Indy in the AFC South Division.

Ponies at Bolts (+3.5) SNF:

The NFL schedule makers have no sense of humor at all, as the Super Bowl champs face off with the best 4-4 team in the NFL. San Diego lost a look ahead battle with the Vikes only a week removed from destroying Houston. The Look Man likes the Bolts in this one, but only because the Ponies lost a heartbreaker last week.
