THE LOOK AHEAD

Minnesota at New England (-5)

The NFL would like to think the problem is that easily remedied, but they are sorely mistaken. The H2H controversy will rise again, as surely as the sun. And if it doesn't, we'll simply see the greatest scoring season in the history of the league.
