THE LOOK AHEAD

Week Fourteen is juicy, with several good games. The great part about this week is that key non-divisional games will have serious impact upon division races. Here's the litany:

Kansas City at Cleveland (-6.5)

This game just ought to be special as the Browns West return to the scene of the crime. KC now includes former Browns head coach Romeo (The Bus Driver) Crennel, O-Co Brian Daboll, QB Brady Quinn (Medicine Woman), RB Peyton (The Avalanche) Hillis, and S Abraham Elam. These guys would love nothing more than to return to Cleveland and kick the Browns' collective butts.

In case you've been on a deserted island, the Baby Backs had an emotional home win after one of their own, LB Jovan Belcher was involved in a murder-suicide last week. It's a tribute to The Bus Driver that they were able to succeed or even play last week. Even Medicine Woman looked like a professional QB, going 19-23 for the "W."

The Browns have been on a little roll of late, and QB Brandon Weeden and WR Josh (Flash) Gordon have connected on some nice deep balls. It's ironic that the QB carousel in Cleveland featured Quinn, McCoy and now Weeden, with Browns Fan backing the wrong horse in nearly every case.

Pokes win, setting the Bengals back in the playoff chase, and having to cancel Christmas. Too bad, because in the words of Santa, "...the Bengals have been sooo good this year, too." Head coach Marvin Lewis has done a fine job with limited talent this year, and deserves Coach of the Year consideration. Pokes.

Washington at Baltimore (+2.5)

Baltimore narrowly escaped San Diego with a questionable 4th and 29 conversion, followed by a physical game loss to the Stillers. They now face the NFL Flava of the Week in Robert (Bob) Griffin III, who is half QB, half cheetah.

New Orleans at Jynts (-5)
