Saturday – AFC:

Buffalo at Houston (-2.5)

Romeo (The Bus Driver) Crennel and the defense have been the real story in Houston, and the offense is struggling without WR Will Fuller (Brush Man). Deshaun Watson now faces a physical Crapchester team which is hungry and talented.

Buffalo is coming off a zebra aided loss to the Chowds, but this team is for real. QB Josh (Irwin) Allen is tough and feisty, and the defense is multiple.
