"He was great to work with and just loved football, just loved football. I think he loved every aspect of it. Coaching it, announcing it, improving it, making it a better game, making it more exciting, making it better for the fans, making it safer, making it more entertaining, and the presentation of it in an entertaining way as well. Just a wonderful man with a really great perspective that did a lot for the game." – Belichick on Madden

Madden crisscrossed the country on his tour bus, stopping to meet the everyman. Despite his prodigious intellect, he believed that Americans are intrinsically good. There can be infighting and disagreement, but his basic premise was captured by his *Three Guys in a Bar* premise: if you ask three guys in a bar if it was a catch, the answer will be self-evident.

The game goes on, and the playoff march will overtake the news cycle, but his was a unique life. We are all better for having him in our world. And that is all you can ask of anyone.

Without further ado, the Look Man Report 2021 for Week Sixteen.

### Celebrity Obit of the Week

The passing of John Madden followed a spectacular Christmas Day *All-Madden* documentary on Fox that featured players, coaches and commentators. If you missed it, you need to go immediately to pay-perview and check it out.

Born John Earl Madden on April 10, 1936, in Austin, Minn., Madden was the son of an auto mechanic. He and his family moved to Northern California in 1942 in hopes of a better life. Madden worked as a teen caddie at San Francisco Golf Club, and quickly realized he would need a college education to succeed in life. He earned a football scholarship to the University of Oregon, and spent a year in pre-law in Eugene. But he didn't really enjoy the study of law, and he returned to Frisco following after a knee injury that cost him his scholarship.

Madden switched his major to education before enrolling at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, where he was a two-year starter on the O and D-lines, and played catcher on the baseball team. Madden was a talented athlete, once chasing down a player following a potential pick six. He was drafted by the Iggles in the 21st round of the 1958 NFL draft. Madden's pro career ended after another knee injury, so he returned to Cal Poly to earn his master's in education.

He turned to coaching and had success as San Diego State's HC before Al Davis, owner of the Oakland Raiders, hired him as assistant coach. Madden was hired as a 32-year old head coach following the resignation of John Mauch, who complained about Davis' constant meddling.

The Raiders made the playoffs eight times under Madden, who held a .759 regular-season winning percentage, still one of the best ever. Madden retired after the 1978 season due to a bleeding stomach

ulcer and fatigue, and many believe it was directly attributable to the injury of New England WR Darryl Stingley in an August 1978 preseason game.

Raiders FS Jack (the Assassin) Tatum, lined up Stingley, following an errant Steve Grogan pass. Grogan, the only NFL QB to wear a neck roll, was a running QB and passing was never his strong suit. His pass fluttered harmlessly past Stingley, but Tatum delivered what is now an illegal clothesline shot.

Darryl Stingley went down with a broken neck and never walked again. Ironically, this tragedy fostered a lifelong friendship with Madden, who took care of Stingley and his family for the rest of both of their lives.

Madden's generosity extended well beyond visits, starting the very night of the injury, When Madden discovered that Chowds HC Chuck Fairbanks was flying home with the team, he called the Oakland Airport, and demanded that Fairbanks be put on the line. "You get Chuck Fairbanks off that plane," Madden insisted.

When Stingley's ventilator quit working a few months later, Madden sounded the alarm credited with saving Stingley's life. He and his wife Virginia provided Stingley's girlfriend with housing and clothing when she arrived in Oakland with only the clothes on her back. Madden would leave Raiders practices to visit Stingley for several hours each day for the rest of the year.

John Madden retired from coaching immediately after the 1978 season, citing burnout, stomach ulcers and fatigue, two years removed from winning the Super Bowl. While he never declared publicly that the Stingley tragedy was the driver, Pat Toomay, a Raiders D-lineman, summed up his coach as follows:

"After an injury, they come back," Toomay wrote. "It might be months later, or even a year later. But they come back. When this fails to happen, as it did in the case of Darryl Stingley, our frailty shows through the masquerade of pads and numbers and facemasks and helmets, the fake armor of invincibility.

"In such a moment, we don't like what we see. An explanation outside the norms of the game is needed, and so scapegoats are sought. Disturbing feelings are pushed aside. Only the rarest among us grasp the depth of our frailty and still love the game. Is John Madden such a man? I think so."

Madden's career blossomed after coaching, when his animated delivery and teaching of Xs and Os was a departure from the old school color commentary. He invented the telestrator, which revolutionized football broadcasting, and later created Madden football video game as a coach's tool. EA Sports, which owns the rights, has generated over \$4 billion in revenue to date.

Madden was known for his fear of flying, which created the Madden Cruiser, a bus to transport him from game to game. He never flew after a claustrophobia attack in Tampa, and discredits the theory involving the 1960 Cal-Poly plane crash where 22 people died, including 16 Cal Poly football players.

Over time, stories spread that he was on the plane, and that the crash caused his fear of flying. "Neither one is true," Madden told the AP. "I didn't like getting on planes before that. I got claustrophobic, and it got worse over the years."

Madden's Hall of Fame career was punctuated by his 1976 Super Bowl XI win over the Hornheads. He was carried off the field by his players afterwards, a moment he recalled in his incredible Hall of Fame speech.

"I was told it took like five or six guys to lift me up, then they dropped me," he said. "But that's OK, because that was me and that was them. They aren't going to carry me off. You carry him off for a while, boom, you dump him on the ground. But it was the happiest moment of my life."

The late Raiders QB Ken Stabler once told the San Francisco Chronicle, "John's strong suit as a coach was how he handled players. He knew football, of course, but we had such a group of free spirits, with different egos and different lifestyles. He acknowledged the fact it was a diverse group.

I always remember John's two rules: Be on time and play hard. There were no dress codes, no haircut rules. Because he treated us that way, nobody abused it."

There have been many giants in the NFL; George Halas is credited as being the Father of Professional Football, but the Look Man believes it was Paul Brown, who invented the face mask, calling the game from the sidelines and professional practice habits. John Facenda voiced NFL Films in the 60s, often credited as being the "voice of God" to Steve Sabols balletic video. But there has never been a personality the size of Madden, and there never will be.

"I'm the luckiest guy in the world," Madden said. "I look at it and I have to pinch myself sometimes, because I've never had to work. I went from a player to a coach to a broadcaster. I've been in the NFL forever. That's my life. That's what I do. I'm just lucky."




