Two in a Million, Doc

The NFL killed two birds with one stone. They provided much needed leverage in the Bengals stadium negotiations while simultaneously generating revenue to pay off the City of St. Louis relocation lawsuit.

The Rams value goes north of \$5 billion if they get a ring, and Cincinnati will never be able to negotiate a favorable stadium lease if the Bengals win it all. Who cares if viewership is the lowest of all time if they increase franchise values/revenue for both teams?

At a minimum, the Cincinnati county commissioner's contention that owners Mike and Katie Brown-Blackburn are not making a good faith effort to field a competitive team just went out the window. 

The balance will be overcome by Burrow's quick passing game, including screens to President Mixon and TE CJ Uzomah, who will play and be productive.
