Commentator Michael (Bucky) Strahan addressed the incident with a sharp rebuke of Sirianni for confronting a team leader. “I don’t understand why Sirianni’s running down there and yelling at one of his star players, A.J. Brown,” Strahan said.

“You know, A.J. Brown wanted to get involved in the game, I’m sure. They took two big shots with him, maybe he said, ‘Give me a shot,’ and the coach said, ‘You had your chance, you better catch the ball next time.’

“But I don’t understand why you do that in the middle of a game like this, because I don’t think that brings out the best in your players. I think it takes away from your players. I think it takes away from the attitude of the team and the energy of the team.”

Fox game analyst Tom (Zoolander) Brady suggested the dust-up between Sirianni and Brown was much ado about nothing. They have a great relationship,” Brady said. “Everyone always makes a lot of that. It’s two great competitors in the heat of the moment. They know how much they care about one another.”

**ZEBRA OF THE WEEK**

What was unbelievable was the flag pickup, due to an obscure evaluation about the offensive lineman being engaged from the line of Scrimmage, obviating the flag.

The NFL rulebook goes on ad nauseum about conditions for calling the foul. If an offensive lineman is more than one yard downfield at the time the pass is released, it is a ten-yard penalty. What is unfathomable is the exceptions and variations verbiage, which goes on for paragraphs, including the following:

*An ineligible player may legally advance more than one yard beyond the line of scrimmage without incurring the penalty if they initiate contact with a defender within one yard of the line and are subsequently driven beyond that point by the opponent's force, as this demonstrates reactive engagement rather than proactive downfield positioning. This provision allows linemen to maintain their blocking responsibilities near the line of scrimmage during pass plays, preventing the rule from overly restricting fundamental offensive tactics while still prohibiting unengaged advancement.*

*Linemen are also permitted limited movement allowances, such as sustaining contact within the immediate vicinity of the neutral zone...*

TV Rules Analyst and NFL Shill Dean Blandino stated that the O-lineman can go one, two or ten yards beyond the line of scrimmage IF he is engaged at the beginning of the play. **"[Cam] Jurgens was downfield, but the exception: if you're blocking within a yard, you can drive that defender five, six, 10 yards downfield. Great flag pickup. Touchdown for the Eagles."**

To this the Look Man calls BS. If any offensive player is engaged with the ball in the air, it constitutes pass interference.

**LA Bolts at Chowds: Ron Torbert**

Bolts QB Justin (Eden) Herbert got destroyed in this game. There were several legitimate hits that made the Look Man wince in vicarious pain. But one call stood out: a Roughing the Passer where the Chowds DT nearly knocked Herbert's head off, with no call by the officials.


NBC Rent-A-Zebra Terry (Bottlegate) McCaulay went ballistic: "It's forcible contact, he still gets roughing the passer protection until he clearly establishes himself as a runner, which he didn't do," McCaulay told Cris Collinsworth and Mike Tirico. "That's forcible contact; it should have been a penalty for roughing the passer. 15 yards."

The Look Man is tempted to turn off any game in which Torbert officiates, but this was over-the-top. The kicker was a first down call for the Bolts in which the Head Linesman and the Line Judge both ruled fourth down. Torbert immediately overturned the calls, signaling first down.

**Crapchester at J-Ville: Brad (Little Head) Allen**

Buffalo had to challenge to overturn a first quarter Jacksonville first down when Trevor (that woman) Lawrence's shin clearly went down before he reached the Line to Gain. The worst part: expedited replay called that a first down, meaning Buffalo HC Sean McDermott had to challenge to get a call that was readily obvious to several million viewers.

To make matters worse Little Head called another first down for Buffalo that was gahbitch, and had to be overturned by replay. He also allowed the J-Squareds to land on Josh Allen's on a sack, and after the whistle head, and ruled J-Ville had one second remaining on a controversial clock management before the half.

The kick missed, but that call wasn't even close. The RT was not set for one second, and the ball was snapped after the clock read 0:00. One of these calls is bad, three are inexcusable.

It should be noted that the NFL uses All-Star Zebra teams in the postseason. These zebras have not worked together as a team, but have been selected as the Best of the Best.

The net impact: unwatchable officiating that undercuts the credibility of the games due to legal wagering on the outcomes. If you use DraftKings, or any other online betting site, you are wasting your money and hurting the game.

And the winner is...**no one**. We all lose when we have to watch this foolishness.

#### THE LOOKAHEAD

The Look Man didn't have time to issue the Lookahead for Wild Card Weekend, but he went a miraculous 4-1. The lone loss was the Stillers 30-6 blowout loss to Houston, resulting in Tomlin's mutual parting from Blitzburgh. The Two Seeds match up very well indeed, as Houston goes to New England to face the ahead-of-schedule Chowds. Both QBs turned the ball over in their previous matchups, and will need to perform better if they want to advance.

Without further ado, the Lookahead:

**Saturday – One Seeds**

*Frisco Niners at Seattle Seahawks (-7/46.5)*

QB Sam (Sixth Sense) Darnold has an oblique injury, which could create a built-in excuse for failure. The Look Man doesn't really trust Darnold, whose twenty turnovers leads the NFL. He lives or dies with his *Legion of Whom* defense, which mitigates his turnovers with stifling ferocity.

Kyle Shanahan deserves Coach of the Year in 2025. His schemes are amazing, including the game clinching Option Pass TD to Chirstian (CMC) McCaffrey. The problem: Houston WR Nico Collins is out with a concussion. The solution: Houston defense is too good. You can't run on them and you can't pass either. Their only weakness is QB scrambles, and even that occurs at your own peril.

*LA Rams at Chicago Monsters of the Red Hots (+4.5/51.5)*

If you missed the fourth quarter of the Green Bay-Chicago Wild Card game last week, you missed an amazing comeback. Chicago parlayed opportunistic defense and some amazing offensive wizardry into none of the greatest comebacks of all time. That fourth down pass from (Me 'n) Caleb Williams was a thing of beauty. He split four Packers and dropped the ball into Rome Odunze's bucket for a first down.

Meanwhile in Carolina, the Rams nearly blew their second game to the Black Cats. Sure, it is a bad matchup, but losing to an NFC Souse Division team is tantamount to public indecency. QB Matt Stafford suffered an index finger contusion in the process, when he hit his throwing hand on a pass rushing DT.

Chicago's defense lost MLB TJ Edwards to a broken fibula, but they survived a good portion of the season without him. CB CJ Gardner-Johnson returns from injury this week, and they will need him. Hell, they need twelve on defense just to cover Puka Nacua.
