
COTY candidate in the making?

You can toss out Jack Fox, whoever he is, and the rest of the list is composed of guys no one wanted.

The Look Man sees a regression to the mean on this list, meaning plenty of movement. There are a lot of guys who will move up quickly, and many who will disappear altogether. Eighteen weeks is a long time for a quarterback to remain healthy, especially if sack numbers continue to increase. Sixty-five QBs started games in 2023, and you may expect that number to be representative.

Defenses are ahead of offenses through the first four weeks, and passing is way down in 2024. If you don't like the numbers in the NFL, just wait a minute. We should know a lot more in the next two weeks, and if Baltimore and Cincy don't start winning, it's going to be a bumpy ride.
