"It's kind of our expectation now," – Bengals WR Ja'Marr Chase on the Bengals becoming the first NFL team to lose four games or more when scoring at least 33 points.

"I feel the pressure on me to be great. I just have to play to the absolute peak of my ability every week for us to go and win. I don't want to end up like Tony Romo, having to put up 51 to win because my defense can't stop a nosebleed." – QB Joe Burrow in response to Chase's comments.

PROLOGUE

The Talking Heads are at it again, becoming masters of the obvious. They are all-in on Detroit, and with good reason. This week, HC Dan (Ankle Biter) Campbell made a gutsy fourth down call to ice a key divisional game against Green Bay. KC BBQ Home Cooking?

The Look Man watched with astonishment the second annual Black Friday game ending between the Raiders and Baby Backs. The game ended on a controversial call in which KC recovered a fumbled snap to ice the game. The Zebras threw a flag for an offensive false start on the play, which typically stops the clock and nullifies the defensive recovery.

But not so fast, my friend. The NFL rulebook contains an odd provision that converts a false start to an illegal shift in the last two minutes. Since the clock was not running the illegal shift becomes a live ball foul, so the defense can decline the penalty, and recover the fumble.

The Look Man has heard grumbling about KC receiving preferential treatment from the Striped Wonders, but this ruling was factually legit. The obvious frustration on the Vegas sideline emanated primarily from the offensive center, who snapped the ball before the O-line and QB were set. After

checking his wallet, the center, Jackson Powers-Johnson accepted responsibility for the loss while others Raiders players and assistants simply buttoned their pieholes.

The Look Man believes there are two issues: (1) the KC defense likely barked a signal ("HUT-HUT") that confused Hyphen Name into snapping early, and (2) HC Antonio (Ambrose) Pierce deserves all of the blame here. The first is a penalty that the zebras likely missed; the second is just the truth.

Pierce is not a bad head coach, but he is being put in a bad spot. He is working with QBs (Chauncey) Gardner Minshew and Aidan (Stand by Me) O'Connell, neither of who can spell "elite." They ejected WR Davante Adams and RB Josh Jacobs for no return. Pierce is being set up for termination by a bad organization.

Woman Gets Decapitated in NFL Game

Trevor (Vicki) Lawrence got knocked out for the season following a late slide at the sticks and a vicious tackle by Houston LB Azeez Al-Shaair. Her helmet bounced on the turf, and al Shair received a three-game suspension for a blow to the head. The NFL contemplated a full season suspension before coming to their senses, but the language in their statement was appalling.

"Your lack of sportsmanship and respect for the game of football and all those who play, coach, and enjoy watching it, is troubling and does not reflect the core values of the NFL. The Baby Backs own the West, and get a win in a big showcase. Did the Look Man mention that factor back RB Isiah (Ferdie) Pacheco is back in Reid's corner? Baby Backs, baby, in the Chili's Bowl.

Cincinnati Bengals at Dallas Pokes (+5.5/49.5) – Monday Night Football

is led by backup QB Cooper Rush (to Judgement), who is relying on WR CeeDee (F-G) Lamb and RB Rico Dowdell to do his bidding. TE Jake (Black Eyed Pea) Ferguson returns from injury in Week Fourteen, kicking productive backup Luke (The Force) Schoonmaker to the pine. The Force was productive in Fergie's absence, posting 14 catches, 144 yards and a TD in three games.

The Bengals are scoring at a prodigious rate without much to show for it. Ja'Marr Chase is killing it, and future Cleveland Browns WR Tee (Magnum) Higgins is mostly up in a contract year. RB Chase Brown is a Pacheco wanna be who is putting up solid numbers.

The problem is that any team with a good TE and reasonable defense can beat Cincy.
