### The Matrix Game

The Bengals followed up the Nick Mangold Game with another thriller in Week Nine against da Bears. QB Joe Flacco's career high 470 passing yards and four TDs, wasn't enough as the Bengals defense couldn't stop anything.

Backup TE Luke Musgrave needs to have a big game blocking and receiving if the Pack wants to claim victory. Musgrave is actually a little faster than Kraft, forcing Philly to cover him with safeties and nickel defenders instead of linebackers. The problem arises if WRs (Sister) Christian Watson and Romeo Doubs can flex the weakness at CB. If they do, the Pack rolls.

### **EPILOGUE**

As the calendar flips from October to November, teams must establish an identity. Once you have decided what you are, then all of your effort can be expended to make that your raison d'etre.

Some teams can be more than one of these; the Iggles and Baby Backs come to mind, as they can win in multiple ways. Unfortunately, injuries can deter a team from pursuing its identity. Green Bay wants to be a run-first team, but the loss of TE Tucker Kraft takes away a key blocker. Detroit lost its identity when faced with a blitzing Hornheads squad that forced the Cadillacs to keep an RB in the backfield for blitz pickup. The result was a tight, 27-24 loss that impacted the balance of the NFC Norse Division.

Similarly, the Ponies finesse offense struggled when faced with a ferocious Stillers pass rush, turning the ball over repeatedly. The outcome was closer than it should have been, but you get the drift.

Belicheat was fond of saying that "the season doesn't begin until Thanksgiving," but it gets late early around here. Teams need to win now, or the conference seeding could create tie-break disadvantages.
