Even if the Browns were to have the draft capital to acquire a top ten QB, the offensive line is in shambles. They would do better to work with Shedeur Sanders, rebuild the team with high picks, and bide their time. Chicago traded the Number One overall to Carolina for WR DJ Moore and picks. They used those picks and free agency to acquire linemen to protect Calebe Williams and the rest is history in the making.

Drafting a QB high results up in self-immolation after the brutal pounding. We don't yet know if Bryce Young can emerge unscathed, but we do know Andrew Luck walked away due to the punishment and the losing. Joe Burrow is making noise about leaving and he was in the Super Bowl in 2022. The Bengals just signed Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins while Burrow has never played behind an O-line rated above 23rd in the NFL.

The Browns are on the clock. Indiana's Mendoza is out of reach, and Oregon's Dante Moore has less than twenty starts on his resume. What remains to be seen is whether the Browns rebuild the team, and wait until 2027 to obtain a QB, IF they still need one.




